What were the total costs incurred by the force (including staff and premises if available) in operating video remand courts from March to December 2020? For how many weeks from March to December 2020 did your force operate video remand courts?

The total costs charged to the Virtual Remand Hearing Sub-Account Code as at the end of January (i.e. inclusive of December OT claims) was £271,138.10. Wolverhampton custody has continued to operate virtual court hearings throughout. A mixture of the other custody blocks ran virtual courts from June 2020 through to December 2020.

7. What estimate has your force made of the total annual costs for the force should you be required to operate video remand courts in the future even if PECS is given permission to and does operate within police custody?

A calculation was made back in early September that (based on the Staffing Model at that time) the costs of running the courts for 12 months would be in the region of £707,200.

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
